- The Council held its regular meeting on Thursday May 4. Following the roll call the Council heard an update on the Development Of a Stream Corridor Management Plan For Waterways below the NYC Delaware River Basin Reservoirs in Delaware County New York by Jeff Skelding Executive Director of Friends Of The Upper Delaware River.
- Paul Rush from NYC DEP will be at the June meeting to discuss plans for an emergency response notification program.
- DRBC Representative Dr. Tom Fikslin provided a PowerPoint presentation explaining their fish tissue monitoring program. They test for mercury levels in Small Mouth Bass, White Suckers, White Perches and Channel Catfish.
- The source of mercury is coal fired plants in the Midwest. Results from the testing is available on the DRBC website.
- PA DC&NR Representative Tim Dugan shared that the Emerald Ash Borer has now been identified in Western Wayne County. It spreads on its own at about 2 miles per year, however much of its expanded territory is a result of being transported in lumber and on vehicles. From the time it is first identified in an area it takes about 5 to 7 years before damage becomes readily visible. Tim also noted that the wet weather this spring has kept the population of gypsy moths down.
